Remembering the Arb at Tappan Square

Oberlin eatery The Arb at Tappan Square, where Oberlin residents and students were able to conveniently pick up sandwiches, smoothies, and salads, closed its door this past July.

Owners Henry and Morgan Smith started the business in late 2020 despite the uncertain future for Oberlin businesses. They acquired the space with the intention of opening a smoke shop, but shifted into providing healthy foods. Starting off with five staff members, the restaurant was one of two Black-owned businesses opened downtown during the pandemic.

By the time of its closure, the staff size had more than doubled to 14 people. In an interview with the Review, Henry Smith discussed how inflation and labor costs made it difficult to maintain his business, especially over the summer. He added that when students are absent, there is a 40 percent drop in business.

"It got to a point where it didn't make business sense anymore," Smith said. "It was a hard decision to close at that point."

Raised in Oberlin, Smith has tried his hand in other business ventures. He has worked in the music industry and owned a record store in town from 2000–2002. Shop on West College Street.

"Maybe one day again we'll revisit and do another restaurant in Oberlin," he said. "It is a great unique place for both students and community, and this is our home, so we like to protect home."

"Living in Oberlin over the summer this year, I loved having it within walking distance. I cannot express how good
